Good evening and welcome to the Beacon for tonight's Southern Combination League Premier Division meeting with Steyning Town...

It was great to see such a big crowd in attendance for our first game competitive game since lockdown against Lancing last Tuesday night.

The evening went superbly from organisational point of view and we would like to thank everyone who attended for following the guidelines and ensuring that we remained safe.

From a football point of view, it was even better. Jack Troak's 95th minute penalty delivered an excellent 3-2 success against a side who topped the table when the season was declared null and void back in March.

It was not a fluke win either. We more than matched the Lancers throughout the evening, an encouraging sign that hopefully we can avoid the struggles of recent seasons.

We know the players appreciated your support and we are looking forward to seeing another large crowd for tonight's match against Steyning.

Last season's meeting with the Barrowmen was full of high drama too; two red cards for our visitors and a 2-1 Hassocks win delivering three very important points back in January.

Saturday saw our FA Cup adventure come to an end away at Isthmian League side Bedfont Sports.

Charlie was again on the scoresheet and his excellent start to the season has seen him pick up the past three Man-of-the-Match awards, voted for by supporters over on our Twitter feed.

Young Mr Pitcher is clearly a very popular player already. If he can make it four-in-a-row this evening, then it will take him into new territory as no individual has ever won the vote for that many successive games - not even Dan Jacques.

Away from first team matters and the Under 18s and Ladies had contrasting starts to their campaigns on Sunday.

Lewis Beebee showed why he was knocking on the door of first team contention in pre-season with a hattrick with the other goals coming from Yahya Azizi and debutants Archie Russell and Josh Sprigg.

The Ladies took on London & South East Regional Division One South title favourites Worthing and were well beaten 10-0 here at the Beacon.

Not many - if any - sides will get close to the Rebels this season, so it was about as hard a first game as you can imagine. Martin Lee and his side will look to go again away at Crawley Wasps this Sunday.

Finally, if anyone is looking for a football fix tomorrow, then the Under 23s are away at St Francis Rangers in their season opener.

SCFL Division Two Cup Runners up 2001 Steyning Town arrive at the Beacon this evening riding hiding. They may not have won a league game yet, but the Barrowmen are making waves in the FA Cup with two noteworthy victories in the past fortnight...

On Saturday, a bumper crowd at the Shooting Field was treated to an excellent 2-1 victory over Hanworth Villa of the Combined Counties League Premier Division.

In the previous round, Gerry Murphy and his men eliminated K Sports of the Southern Counties East League via a 2-0 away win.

It is fair to say that Southern Combination League clubs have not had a great recent record against opponents from outside of our league, so for the Barrowmen to eliminate two such teams is a real achievement.

At the time of writing, we do not yet know who Steyning will face in the first qualifying round proper, but needless to say everyone at the Beacon wishes them well in flying the flag for Sussex football.

An FA Cup run would be the latest staging post for a club who have been on a real rise over the past five years since their 3G pitch was installed at the Shooting Field.

The highlight was undoubtedly the 2018-19 season, when Murphy led the Barrowmen to promotion from Division One as runners up to Alfold as well as lifting the Division One Cup.

That success brought Premier Division football to Steyning for the first time in 33 years and they were going well on their return to the top flight before the season was declared null and void, sitting in 10th spot.

Murphy was appointed as a full time general manager in the summer, a move that reflects Steyning's importance in the community, the benefits of having a 3G pitch and the confidence that the club have in continuing to move forwards.

Back in the 1980s, the Barrowmen were one of the biggest clubs in Sussex, winning Sussex Senior Cups, Southern Combination League titles, Peter Bentley and Sussex RUR Charity Cups.

Could they return to those allconquering days? The ambition is certainly there and with their FA Cup exploits, they have shown that they can beat any time in the Premier Division on their day.

Hassocks have another tough task on their hands tonight.

There has been a constant flow of players between Hassocks and Steyning Town over the past decade or so and two from each side could be lining up against their former club this evening.

For Hassocks, **Andy Whittingham** joined the Robins for his first spell at the Beacon from Steyning in the summer of 2010, one of a number of players to make the move from the Shooting Field when **Mark Dalgleish** became assistant manager to Mickey Jewell.

Goalkeeper Mike Abbott, Lee Waterhouse and Sam Goodridge were the other names to follow Dalgleish across while the manager

also raided his former club a few years later for striker **Craig Knowles.**

The other current Hassocks player to have turned out for Steyning is forward **Chris Neatherway,** a summer signing for Dave John who has looked lively in his two appearances so far.

For the Barrowmen, current club captain **Alex Gathern** played 21 times for the Robins over the 2013-14 and 2014-15 seasons after joining from Burgess Hill Town.

Gerry Murphy can call upon another former Hassocks defender with Josh Tuck having recently joined Steyning from Saltdean United. Tuck played 19 times for the Robins during the 2017-18 campaign before moving onto Shoreham and Broadbridge Heath.

Other notable names to play for both include The Wizard **Jamie Weston**, who played over 100 times for Hassocks between 2010 and 2013 and spent the second half of last season at the Shooting Field.

Ben Bacon has turned out for both sides in a couple of spells as part of his quest to play for every single club in Sussex, Liam Benson had a brief month with the Barrowmen at the start of last season and John Suter joins Dalgleish in managing the two clubs.

ENTI AND STOKES SCORE TO SEE OFF NINE MAN STEYNING

Two red cards, three goals and plenty of controversy made for an entertaining afternoon at the Beacon where Hassocks and Steyning Town met in a league fixture for the first time in 25 years.

The Robins ended up winning 2-1, 19th in the table beating eighth in something of an upset – although whether Hassocks would have won had Steyning managed to keep their discipline is up for debate.

The visitors were reduced to 10 men with eight minutes of the first half remaining when Mayckol Sabino decided to rake his studs down the back of Will Broomfield after a firm but fair challenge.

Broomfield certainly made the most of the situation, but you can't kick out at an opponent like Sabino did

The away support were incensed by the red but most tellingly, Steyning captain and former Hassocks defender Alex Gathern could be heard berating Sabino for his stupidity as the striker trudged off

It was another ex-Hasssocks player who picked up the Barrowmen's other red card, although what Jamie Weston did to deserve the first sending off of his career remained a mystery.

His first yellow was for an innocuous trip out on the right in the first half. The second came in front of the home dugout late in the second half.

Weston said afterwards that he wasn't even sure what it was for and given that he's one of the nicest men in football, it's hard to believe that he could have said anything untoward, nor were either of his tackles worthy of bookings.

To compound Steyning's misery, Jamie Brotherton then lost his head and talked himself into a spell in the sin bin, leaving the visitors to try and find an equaliser with only eight players on the pitch in the final 10 minutes.

That Steyning had more of the ball and were still creating chances despite a three man disadvantage suggests that, had they not had players kicking out and mouthing off, this could have been a very different afternoon.

The biggest question at half time was where were the goals going to come from for Hassocks to take advantage of their numerical superiority?

Phil Johnson's nightmare season has lurched back into the treatment room again as he's out for an indefinite period with an ankle ligament problem.

Ben Bacon has departed for Three Bridges and Blagomir Mastagarkov's brief Hassocks career already looks to be over.

Liam Benson ploughed a lonely furrow up top but chances were few and far between.

In the end, it was two midfielders who struck to give the Robins the perfect response to the previous week's 7-0 hammering at the hands of Eastbourne Town.

Harvey Enticknap scored the first on the hour mark after James Littlejohn danced away down the left and delivered a low cross.

Steyning had chances to clear, but two defenders both passed up the opportunity which left Enticknap to rifle home at the back post.

The Barrowmen almost levelled straight from kick off when Rob Clark smashed the crossbar with Charlie Pugh well beaten.

Dan Stokes added the hosts' second nine minutes later when Steyning tried to play their way out of their own box, only to gift possession to Hassocks.

A few swift passes later and the ball was switched to the other side of the area where Stokes was lurking to

make it 2-0 via a heavy deflection.

Steyning pulled one back on 75 with the goal of the game, a sweeping passing move which Conor Bull finished with aplomb.

That looked like it would set up a nervy last 15 minutes. Weston's dismissal and Brotherton's 10 minutes off the pitch reduced the threat slightly, but the relief at the final whistle among the home contingent was still palpable.

Before Sabino's early bath, Pugh had been forced into two good saves low down from Bull while Littlejohn and Stokes had both flashed in crosses which Benson couldn't quite get on the end of.

The outstanding Dan Turner broke up a couple more dangerous looking Steyning attacks and he also tested Conor Kelly with a towering header from a Littlejohn set piece.

Broomfield had a similar second half chance superbly repelled by Kelly and Pugh had to be alert to turn away Josh Maher's effort three minutes prior to Enticknap's opener.

The strangest moment of a strange afternoon though was reserved for Harry Mills, who picked up a ridiculous booking for jumping on Kelly for a piggyback as the Steyning goalkeeper was about to launch a kick down pitch.

Mills quite rightly picked up a deserved booking, much to the amusement of a home bench which featured Phil Wickwar as substitute goalkeeper; Wickwar also having provided the keeping backup in the previous league meeting between the sides back in 1995.

JEWELL'S HALF TIME ROCKET FIRES **HASSOCKS INTO ROUND TWO**

Mickey Jewell read his Hassocks players the riot act at half time of their **Sussex Senior Cup First** Round replay with Steyning Town and the Robins duly responded to book an intriguing home tie with Ryman South highflyers Whitehawk in the next round.

Despite struggling near the bottom of County League Division Two, Steyning had caused Hassocks real problems over the course of 120 minutes at the Shooting Field 18 days previously.

On that occasion, it took a 112th minute equaliser from Kieran O'Callaghan to earn this replay and spare Hassocks' blushes and for the first 45 minutes here at the Beacon, Steyning gave Hassocks plenty to think about again.

They hit the bar inside of the opening five minutes after some exquisite skills from Lewis Levoi, a player who also possessed a long throw which caused numerous problems for Hassocks before the break.

Levoi rattling the crossbar was a warning sign for the Robins and to be fair, it did spark them into life as they swept straight up the other end to earn an eighth minute penalty for handball which Phil Gault duly converted.

The lead didn't last long. Jack Simpson had been a doubt with flu in

the 48 hours before the game and he Nathan Miles. played despite clearly being unwell, which perhaps affected his judgement as he missed his first attempt at gathering a cross before weakly punching the ball only as far as the edge of the area.

Lurking there was Steyning's Sean Pickup, who seized the opportunity superbly by sending a crisp volley into the back of the net for 1-1.

Although Hassocks were never that fluid over the remaining 30 minutes of the first half, they did manage to create four or five good opportunities, the majority of which fell to Dan Smith.

Unfortunately for Hassocks and their young striker, Smith seemed to have left his shooting boots at home and a frustrating half of football subsequently came to a close with the scores level.

Jewell's rocket followed and the Hassocks boss would have been pleased with the reaction as his side retook the lead just seven minutes after the restart, Smith belatedly making a chance count for his third of the campaign.

After nearly three hours of football between these two, all of a sudden the gap in quality between a side with top five ambitions in Division One and one scrapping to survive in Division Two became apparent.

There was no way back for Steyning once substitute Dan Barnard **Starman:** Kieran O'Callaghan, a had added a third just a couple of minutes after coming on in place of

That made it two goals in two games for Barnard since his move from Uckfield Town, marking him out as a shrewd acquisition given the long term injuries which Sam Jeremiah and Neil Kane are suffering

It was another new striker who added the fourth in injury time, Dan Shergold scoring his first goal in Hassocks colours with a bullet header.

The Robins weren't done there though and with Steyning completely spent, they found the time to add a fifth through a beautiful finish from the deserving Lee Waterhouse, also opening his account for Hassocks and against one of his former clubs too.

Waterhouse wasn't the only player with Steyning connections, Jewell's assistant manager Mark Dalgleish having been recruited from the Shooting Field in the summer and brining with him a whole host of players, although Andy Whittingham was the only one to feature alongside Waterhouse on this occasion.

THE GRANTS THAT HAVE KEPT THE BEACON OPEN

Preparing a non-league football club for reopening after months of lockdown in which there has been no income is a difficult task. Here at Hassocks, we were grateful for grants from the Premier League, the FA, the Football Foundation and the government for allowing us to be to able to welcome you all back...

Robins score £1500 grant from the Pitch Preparation Fund

Hassocks were given a helping hand this summer thanks to a £1500 grant from the Pitch **Preparation Fund which has** been used to improve the Beacon playing surface.

The Pitch Preparation Fund was set up as a joint venture between the Premier League, the Football Association and the Government's Football Foundation to assist clubs who have faced unprecedented challenges because of the Covid-19 outbreak.

The Robins received zero income after the Southern Combination League season was declared null and void at the start of March, leaving the club with no means to repair and improve the Beacon pitch over the summer.

The Pitch Preparation Fund money helped to fill a hole in the

club's finances, allowing us to ensure that the Beacon was in a match-fit state for when the Government and FA announced that it is safe to play football.

We had originally planned extensive work on the pitch to further final, various cup finals at Under 18 improve drainage this summer.

An unusually high number of home games were postponed over the course of a very wet 2019-20 season, leaving the Robins with nearly a third of their season still to play when the campaign was ended.

Those plans had to be put on hold however because of the lack of income coming into the Beacon.

We now hope to carry out major improvements next summer should the situation allow it, with the £1500 from the Pitch Preparation Fund being used to help tide us over for the 2020-21 campaign.

The Beacon has long been considered one of the best venues on the Southern Combination League circuit, thanks to its pitch.

Hassocks regularly host the league's Peter Bentley League Cup level as well as Brighton Schools' finals and representative games.

With the Robins' first team, Under 23s, Under 18s and Ladies all using the pitch alongside some Junior teams for show piece matches, it is normally played on over 100 times in a season.

The Pitch Preparation Fund Grant will help to ensure that it can continue to be used with such frequency over the coming season and early signs are that groundsman Alan John has used the money well as the surface has been excellent in the opening weeks of the campaign.

How the Beacon was made safe for reopening to supporters

The Beacon has been made ready to welcome football supporters again in the 2019-20 season thanks to a grant from the Football Foundation, the Premier League and the FA.

Hassocks were awarded £500 to ensure that social distancing and high hygiene standards can be maintained with fans allowed back to watch nonleague football.

The improvements that have been made around the ground include the installation of card payment machines at the Robins Bar, the T Bar and the turnstiles to reduce the amount of cash being handled.

For the past decade, players and fans have been asking with increasing frequency when the Beacon would move towards the 21st century and a cashless society.

The cost had always proven prohibitive before but thanks to the

Football Foundation Grant, we are now there.

WiFi has been installed, a necessity for card payments to be processed. The password will be publicly available for all guests, which receive a lot of criticism for not has already pleased both our own media team and sports reporters who were in attendance for last week's win over Lancing.

Hand sanitiser stations have been placed throughout the clubhouse and around the ground and a clearly marked one-way system has been put in place.

Supporters have been asked to enter the clubhouse through the front door on the halfway line and exit via the side door opposite the turnstile block.

There are also markers to help keep the required one metre apart.

The Robins produced a Covid-19 risk assessment, a legal requirement ahead of the reopening of the Beacon. You can view the document on the information page of our website.

Whilst the Premier League and FA looking after clubs down the pyramid these two have proved vital in terms of allowing us to welcome you back to the Beacon in as normal a way as possible.

Everyone is aware of the financial implications that lockdown had - you only need to look at the behaviour of other clubs with large wage bills who wanted to divert grants towards paying players - and without the money we were awarded, we would have been struggling to reopen the gates to a safe environment for both fans and players.

The two grants are proof that there still remains some good in football.







TROAK'S NERVES OF STEEL GIVE ROBINS EYE CATCHING SUCCESS

Southern Combination League Premier Division Tuesday 8th September 2020, The Beacon **Hassocks 3-2 Lancing**

Competitive football returned to the Beacon for the first time in 209 days and it proved to be well worth the wait as Jack Troak's 95th minute penalty secured an eye catching 3-2 win for Hassocks over last season's table toppers Lancing.

This is likely to be a really good result for Dave John's side. The Lancers were sitting pretty in first place in the Premier Division when the 2019-20 season was curtailed and although manager Naim Rouane subsequently resigned, his replacements James Rhodes and Kane Louis have kept most of that quality squad together.

It would be a surprise if Lancing were not there or there abouts again this season. Hassocks matching them stride for stride in front a bumper crowd augurs well for the campaign ahead.

Having an individual with the quality of Charlie Pitcher helps too. Pitcher was the best player on the park in the first half, a central figure at the heart of everything good Hassocks did.

Pitcher fashioned the first real opportunity after a lively opening 17 minutes. A David Beckham-esque switch of play from left flank to right released James Littlejohn whose low cutback cross was touched by Harvey Enticknap to Bradley Bant to curl just wide.

Eight minutes later and only the quick reactions of Lancing defender Liam Hendy nipping in to win a loose ball prevented Pitcher heading home the rebound after Mitch Bromage did well to parry a powerful strike from Hassocks debutant Chris Neatherway.

Bromage's next stop required excellent reactions as he used a toe to deflect a Pitcher effort wide after quick footwork had sent Harrison Parker on a merry dance.

There was nothing that Bromage could do to prevent Pitcher and Hassocks getting the goal that their opening half hour warranted.

Bant this time was the one spraying the ball around like Beckham, his 40 yard pass finding Pitcher on the edge of the box.

Pitcher still had plenty to do, bringing the ball down with his chest, this time turning Hendy inside out and burying an effort into the corner.

That was Lancing's cue to start playing. Within 60 seconds, the visitors were level as Ebou Jallow was played in and he coolly rounded Dave Carruthers to restore parity.

Eight minutes later and the slick passing football that became the Lancers' trademark last season saw them slice through the Hassocks defence to make it 2-1, Jallow again the man to finish off a flowing move.

The second half was just six minutes old when Pitcher caused more carnage, skipping past a couple of Lancing challenges before flicking the ball expertly into a gaping gap between Bromage and Hendy.

All that was needed from the onrushing Troak was a touch but the winger could not quite get there and the ball trickled behind for a goal kick, much to the relief of Lancing.

The unwell Harvey Enticknap departed the action next, his place taken by teenager Alfie Loversidge, making a real impression whenever he was on the ball in his 40 minutes in the middle of the park.

Carruthers produced a flying save to turn away a liquid volley from James Water who looked thirsty for goals whilst at the other end, Dan Turner's towering header had to be tipped over at full stretch by Bromage.

When Pitcher limped off on 74 minutes, Lancing could have been forgiven for thinking that their evening was about to get easier as Hassocks were forced into a double





change, Louis Pittock also exiting through injury with Joe Bull and Jack Gardner the replacements.

Bull though was to make quite the impact. Within six minutes of his introduction, he latched onto a low Andy Whittingham cross, guiding a deft flick past Bromage without breaking stride.

It was a beautiful equaliser and it set up a grandstand finish. Ben Connolly drew a massive save from Carruthers as the game entered injury time with a rising shot that the Hassocks goalkeeper did superbly to turn away given he cannot have seen it until late.

Three minutes later and Connolly was lucky to stay on the pitch as his cynical lunge when nowhere near the ball brought Loversidge crashing to ground as the young forward looked to advance into the Lancing box.

A spot of handbags followed with the Hassocks bench in disbelieve that Connolly had avoided being sent off.

Those complaints soon gave way to joy; from the free kick that Connolly's trip had conceded, Hassocks pumped the ball into the area to win a very soft penalty with the clock now showing 95.

If referee Robert King was awarding the spot kick to make up for the fact that he realised Connolly should have seen red, then the trade worked out well for Hassocks as Troak showed nerves of steel to confidently despatch past Bromage with the final kick of the game.

It was a good thing too as Pitcher was again the man who was involved in everything good that Hassocks did

Actually, that should be 87 minutes. For Hassocks endured a nightmare start in which they fell behind with less than 180 seconds on the clock from a bundle in the box.

Daniel Opoku-Boateng escaped down the right and his cross in sparked a game of pinball. Jordan Espirit saw his initial effort blocked but the lively Bedfont striker managed to turn the ball home at the Bedfont got 10 minutes after the second attempt amongst the melee.

And yet that is exactly what restart when they were awarded that controversial spot kick.

Espirit stepped up and although Carruthers went the right way, it was a penalty well placed just out of the reach of the Hassocks goalkeeper.

The reaction of the home crowd rolling back the years to the 2010 World Cup in South Africa with a vuvuzela - suggested they thought that was game over.

Hassocks - or to be precise, Pitcher - had other ideas. Eight minutes later and the Robins striker silenced the Bedfont squad with a brilliant goal, picking the ball up on halfway, beating two men and finishing into the bottom corner.

Two goals in the last two minutes denied Hassocks what would have been a very good three points against one of the Premier Division title favourites.

The Robins had stormed into a 2-0 lead at the break against Eastbourne Town through Dan Stokes and Josh Hawkes and looked like they would secure a hugely impressive victory before things took a turn for the worse right at the death.

Wes Tate's second of the game on 91 to level the scores was gutting enough.

Yet there was an even more sickening twist when Kenny Poque netted a 93rd minute winner to ensure Town left with the win.

A draw was the least that Hassocks deserved from an encounter in which they looked every bit as good as their illustrious opponents for the majority of the 90 minutes.
