So, what will the new season bring to the Saffrons? Town have a good crop of young players A fir coming through, as evidenced by them winning the Under 23
League Cup back in May with victory over Steyning Town.

MacDonald has made some shrewd acquisitions too, not least bringing experienced and proven goal -getter Evan Archibald back to the Saffrons after a spell at Bexhill United.

Archibald has pretty decent record against the Robins, so task number one today will be attempting to keep him quiet.

Doing that will help prove that last season's league double over Town was no fluke after years of the yellow

A first win at the Saffrons since 2006 on Valentine's Day was followed up by a convincing 4-1 victory at the Beacon on the final afternoon of the Premier Division season.

Those two victories ended a 17 year wait for Hassocks to take six points from Town in the same campaign.

What might help us today is Town's notoriety for being slow starters.

Under Lambert, they tended to take until the autumn to get up and running before making a late charge into the promotion picture.

It was a similar story last season. We had originally been due to visit

the Saffrons in November, when Town sat 14th in the Premier Division standings.

By the time the game eventually took place two postponements later on February 14th, Town had risen to fifth following a superb run of only three defeats in 23 matches.

If MacDonald can buck the trend and get Town off to a good start in his second season in charge - combined with their normal impressive run of results later in the campaign - then they will fancy their chances of significantly improving on 2022-23's ninth place finish.

An intriguing afternoon lies in store to open the new campaign.

Played for the Robins and Town

Hassocks defender Sam Smith started his senior career with **Eastbourne Town in the final** throes of their days as an **Isthmian League club.**

Smith moved to the Saffrons from the other side town, where he had been in the Under 19s setup at National League side Eastbourne Borough.

He played four tomes for Town in the 2013-14 campaign before going onto make 24 appearances across the Hassocks colours in a 3-0 win over backline in the 2014-15 season.

After several long term injuries, Smith opted for a change of scenery with his next port of call being Loxwood.

It was from the Nest that Brad Sweetman signed Smith in November 2021 for the Robins and he is now closing in on 50 matches for the club.

Young winger **JJ Minty** played for both Eastbourne Town and ourselves

in the 2022-23 campaign on dualregistration from Burgess Hill Town.

Minty started the season at the Saffrons, making 10 appearances and scoring twice.

One of those goals came on his debut as Town ran out 3-0 winners away at Roffey on the opening day.

Minty moved to the Beacon in Occtober, starting five times and appearing twice from the bench.

He scored his one and only goal in AFC Uckfield Town.

Minty has subsequently joined Haywards Heath Town for the new campaign.

Former Town goalkeeper James **Broadbent** picked up a clean sweep of Players' Player, Managers' Player and Supporters' Player of the Season Awards during his one year at the Beacon, playing a huge role in the 2016-17 Great Escape from

relegation.

That included saving a match winning penalty to secure a first three points against Town in a decade.

Striker **Dan Smith** played for Town in their Isthmian days having rattled through three separate spells with Hassocks.

Smith ended up making 63 appearances and scoring 26 goals in his Robins career.

Finally, blink and you would have missed the Hassocks career of midfielder Scott Kirkwood.

He enjoyed a very, very brief spell at the Beacon in the 2018-19 season when looking to get minutes under his belt as he returned from longterm injury whilst a Horsham player.

Kirkwood turned out for Town several years before his short time as a Robin.

Behind the Stats

Before last season's 1-0 win at the Saffrons, Hassocks had suffered 10 consecutive defeats against Eastbourne Town.

That is the worst run of form the Robins have ever recorded against a fellow Southern Combination League club.

The number of goals conceded probably set some kind of record too, Town racking up 36 in that time at an average of more than 3.5 per game.

No wonder it felt like such a big

moment when Hassocks won 1-0 down on the Sunshine Coast on Valentine's Day, Phil Johnson's strike early in the second half ending that barren run and securing a first win at the Saffrons since 2006.

Just like London Buses, you wait 10 matches for the Robins to beat Eastbourne Town and then they do it in back-to-back meetings.

The 4-1 Hassocks victory on the final day of the previous season secured a first double over Town

since that same 2005-06 campaign.

17 years may have passed but the identity of one of the Robins' scorers remained the same.

Suer Pat Harding got the first goal for Hassocks back in April having scored twice when the Robins last completed the double by beating Town 5-2, also on the final day of the season

Graham Beveridge, Anthony Hibbert and Sam Fisk were the other scorers that afternoon.





Robins secure top 10 finish in some style by thrashing Town

Hassocks secured their first top 10 finish for nine years in some style, hammering **Eastbourne Town 4-1 at the** Beacon on the final day of the **Southern Combination** Premier Division season.

Victory also secured a first league double over Town since 2005-06, the latest in a series of hoodoos James Westlake and his players have ended over the campaign.

Hassocks fans with long memories might recall that the previous double against Town was similarly secured via three points on the final day under the Mid Sussex sunshine.

17 years may have passed, but the identity of one of the Robins goal getters remains the same. Super Pat Harding scored twice then alongside Graham Beveridge, Anthony Hibbert and Sam Fisk.

This time around, Harding gave the Robins a first half lead. Jack Troak doubled it 10 minutes after the break before a somewhat unexpected grandstand finish.

Three goals came in stoppage time as Leon Turner and Alex Brewer - who was only a year old when Harding scored that brace against Town in 2006 – found the net either side of a Callum Barlow consolation for the visitors.

Both sides set their stalls out to attack from the opening whistle. That made for an engaging contest, although it was assistant referees Alex Howard and Paul Rowe who were the busiest people on show in the first 15 minutes.

Liam Benson beat Chris Winterton only for the offside flag to go up. Fletcher Holman then slotted past James Shaw, but he suffered the same fate.

Benson drew a good save from Winterton just after his disallowed goal as part of a strong start from Hassocks.

Once Town had weathered the storm, they grew into the game. Leon Greig made Shaw work before Town players combined again on the 20 minute mark.

Holman had a shot well repelled by Shaw and Greig could not quite force the rebound home thanks to some attentive defending from ex-Town man Sam Smith.

Two minutes later and Harding struck his second in as many games. The goal took the sting out of proceedings and the remaining 25 minutes of the first half were played in what can only be described as an end-of-season lull.

The Robins came out after the break with a bit more life about them, forcing a couple of early set pieces.

It was from one of those that the second Hassocks goal arrived. Winterton produced a sprawling save from Joe Bull, the subsequent corner was only not cleared effectively by Town and that gave Troak the chance to hit a rocket from distance for his eighth of the season.

With nothing to lose and only half hour of the campaign remaining, Town chucked on three strikers in an attempt to salvage something from the game.

Rather than opening the game up as you might expect, this gung-ho approach bizarrely resulted in a similar period of tedium as the first half suffered from.

Greig crossed for Holman to fire over. Town then had half-hearted penalty appeals waved away when Oliver Davies went down in the box after a collision with Troak.

Otherwise, there was precious little to report until injury time, when proceedings suddenly fired back to life as three substitutes got on the scoresheet in the space of a surreal 180 seconds.

The clock showed 90 when Anesu

Sisaymia picked up a booking for a foul on Josh Bradlev.

Hassocks worked a clever free Holman's offside effort and those two kick but it looked like the danger had passed when Town regained possession, only for Jack Murphy to give the ball away cheaply.

That allowed the Robins to work the ball to the unmarked Turner and he duly fired into the top right corner to put Hassocks 3-0 ahead.

Town produced the ideal response, substitute Barlow displaying perfect control and a cool head to chip over Shaw after the visitors gained dispossessed Hassocks straight from the restart.

Any Town celebrations were very short lived as almost immediately, Brewer added a fourth for the Robins.

It was his first senior goal to go with the 21 in 20 appearances he has plundered for the Under 18s, who enjoyed an excellent campaign in reaching the semi finals of two cup competitions whilst looking set to finish third in the league.

Again, Town's marking was questionable and that presented Brewer with the opportunity to head beyond Winterton to wrap up a memorable campaign which gives Hassocks plenty to build on.

Laing double helps Hassocks ruffle feathers of title favourites Town

If anyone needed confirmation about just how good Hassocks had been in the first half of their Tuesday night encounter against **Eastbourne Town, then the** dressing down visiting boss **Dave Winterton gave his** players during the break should have been enough.

Winterton's verbal lashing permeated the walls of the Beacon Clubhouse, could be heard on the far side of the ground and probably a quarter of a mile away in the centre of the village.

Time and time again, Hassocks had carved open one of the County League title favourites and Winterton knew that his side were very lucky that the Robins were only 1-0 ahead rather than having put the game to bed.

Hassocks began the game at a ferocious tempo, hitting the post inside the first five minutes via Joe Fernley with the loose ball scrambled behind at the expense of a corner by the Town defence.

From the subsequent delivery, the evergreen Andy Fisk rattled the same became even more so, Town going upright as Fernley and Graham Beveridge saw his follow up effort hacked off the line.

Having seen some the Robins' older warhorses leading the charge, next it was the lively Pat Harding's turn to torment the Town defence.

Harding took centre stage, looking sharp in everything he did other than his finishing as the visitors Harding. struggled to find any answer to the Robins' talisman.

He could have easily had a first half hat-trick, a combination of some uncharacteristically poor finishing and clear. one outstanding save from Russell Tanner preventing Harding getting on advantage of this slice of luck in the scoresheet.

Questions were asked of Tanner for his role in the Robins' opener which arrived with 22 minutes on the clock.

The Town goalkeeper looked set to deal comfortably with a cross into the box, only to be beaten in a straight jump by James Laing, opening his account for the season.

As well as a lot of shouting, Winterton also made a slight tactical tweak at half time to hand his captain Scott Price more freedom to roam in the space between the Hassocks defence and midfield.

By the time the Robins had got to grips with Price's new commission, he than their effort at Nyetimber Lane had beaten Joel Harding with two fine right footed strikes to turn the game on its head and put Town into the lead.

An already entertaining encounter on the attack to try and secure a third which would kill the game off whilst Hassocks returned to the same gear they were in during the first half in attempt to find an equaliser.

Tanner made several good saves to thwart the Robins, including a superb stop from Laing every bit as good as his first half save from

Hassocks did eventually find a way through, an awkward bounce taking the ball away from the Town defence and leaving Laing in the

The Hassocks striker took glorious style, beating Tanner with a perfectly controlled lob to level the game at 2-2.

Tanner blotted his copybook a little with a late booking for dissent as Town let their frustrations get the better of them, although nobody with visiting connections could deny that Hassocks were worthy of a point.

Particularly pleasing to Dave John would have been that this performance and result followed the disappointment of a 1-0 reversal at Pagham on the opening day of the

If Hassocks can regularly repeat this showing against Town rather on Saturday over the course of the next eight months, then the Robins could be in for a very good season indeed. Just ask Winterton.

Robins route to silverware revealed

In the early stages of the national cup competitions, Hassocks have been handed a home tie in the Emirates FA Cup and an away trip in the FA Vase.

Erith Town will visit the Beacon in the extra preliminary round of the FA Cup next weekend, Saturday 5th August at 3pm.

The Dockers finished fourth in the Southern Counties East Premier Division last season, their third consecutive top 10 placing.

It will be the fifth meeting between the Robins and Town. The most recent came at the same stage of the FA Cup in the 2018-19 season, the Dockers winning 3-1 at the Beacon through a Luis Valencia brace and a Alex Nelson strike. Spencer Slaughter had opened the scoring for Hassocks.

The Robins saw off Town 3-0 in another extra preliminary clash at the Beacon as they made it to within two games of the first round proper in the 2005-06 campaign. Pat Harding scored twice and Anthony Hibbert once.

Two other meetings took place in

the 2000-01 season. The sides played out a 2-2 preliminary round draw at the Erith Sports Stadium before Hassocks triumphed 3-1 in the replay three days later.

Hassocks will have added incentive to progress this time beyond the prize money and it being the world's greatest cup competition.

The winners will face an away tie against either Sutton Common Rovers Combination League Division One. or Burgess Hill Town on Saturday 19th August.

The Robins have not faced their Mid Sussex neighbours in a competitive game since the 2003-04 season.

In the FA Vase, Hassocks have been given a bye to the second qualifying round where they will travel to either Sheerwater or Clapton.

Sheerwater finished 16th of 20 in the Combined Counties League Premier Division South last season.

Clapton are one of the most famous non-league clubs in the country and will compete in the Eastern Counties League Division One South in 2023-24 following relegation from the Essex Senior League.

The Robins have played neither side before in a competitive fixture. The game will take place on Saturday 23rd September.

Hassocks have been given a bye through to the second round of the Peter Bentley League Cup, where a trip to either Worthing United or Selsey awaits.

Both clubs are in Southern The tie will take place on Tuesday 26th September.

Should the Robins progress to round three, then another potential Mid Sussex Derby lies in wait at home to Haywards Heath Town - providing the Blues overcome Wick in their second round tie.

After last season's organisational issues with the Sussex Principal RUR Charity Cup, the County FA informed the league that the competition would be drawn before the season started.

Indeed, the first round is due to take place on Tuesday 22nd August. It probably will not come as a surprise for you to learn that fixtures are yet to be confirmed at the time of going to press.

Peckham 2-5 Hassocks.

Two months after the 2022-23 season ended in Sussex Principal RUR Charity Cup quarter final defeat at Peacehaven & Telscombe, Hassocks were back in action as their pre-season friendly fixtures kicked off at Peckham Town.

It proved to be a lovely jubly afternoon for the Robins as they ran out 4-1 winners thanks to goals from Liam Benson, Sam Geard, Super Pat

Kyle Woolven grabbed his first goal in Hassocks colours since arriving from AFC Varndeanians with a successfully converted penalty.

Last season's Under 18s top scorer Alex Brewer also notched as he continues to make a mark.

Brewer hit 21 goals in 21 matches

He then rounded off his campaign by opening his account for the first team in the 4-1 win over Eastbourne Town which completed Hassocks' Premier Division season.

Brewer was one a number of young players given an opportunity at Jubilee Fields, Westlake selecting his squad with one eye on a tougher test at Epsom & Ewell on Monday.

> Ryan Brackpool dropped deep to pick up the ball in front of his own backline. Several passes later and Heath swept the ball out to Mason Doughty on the right.


From there, Doughty showed fantastic vision to split the Hassocks defence with a pass straight through the middle, sending the lively Quiasacca clear.

Hassocks 0-3 Burgess Hill

For the sixth successive season, the Ann John Trophy heads back to the More Than Tyres Stadium. **Burgess Hill Town breezed past** Hassocks 3-0 at the Beacon on an evening when a record amount was raised for St Peter & **St James Hospice by a bumper** crowd.

Those in attendance dug deep to donate over £1600, taking the total amount raised over the past decade past the £15,000 mark.

It is quite a legacy in memory of the wife of Robins chairman Dave, much missed since she passed away from cancer in 2014.

Hill's dominance of the fixture in recent seasons has been absolute. Hassocks came close to ending it a year ago, only being denied a draw late in the day and the trophy subsequently shared by a controversial late penalty converted by Lewis Finney.

This was a reversal back to the norm, whereby the Robins struggle to out a Kieron Pamment drive from six lay a glove on their higher division opponents.

Hassocks fell behind as early as the third minute and although there was plenty of huffing and puffing from a starting XI missing some big name players, it was a straightfor-

ward success which extended the Hillian's unbeaten start under new boss Dean Cox to three matches.

Rob O'Toole was the scorer of the early opener, needing only 180 seconds to grab his first goal back in Hill colours since re-joining from Whitehawk.

Martyn Box hung up a cross to the back post where O'Toole was waiting to bundle home.

O'Toole went from a classic poacher's goal to almost doubling the lead with something utterly spectacular. An audacious overhead kick on 10 second good chance when unable to minutes whistled inches over the top of Fraser Trigwell's crossbar.

Next O'Toole turned provider, squaring for Dan Perry. With the goal gaping, Perry hit an effort which posed more of a threat to houses in Hurstpierpoint than it did Trigwell.

The 27 minute mark brought three good chances for Hill in quick succession. A miraculous block on the line from teenager Sam Fernley kept yards.

O'Toole was then denied a header by a good Trigwell save and from the resulting corner, Reece Hallard was left free but could only nod over.

Hill were by this point playing some delightfully free flowing stuff. Box cut inside young Fernley and was not far away with a drive from 25 yards.

Another multipass move released O'Toole in a wide position and his left wing cross was volleyed over by Reggie Ward, put off by some impressive tracking back from Hassocks captain for the evening, Pat Harding.

The second half continued in much the same vein. Hallard lifted over Trigwell, only for the ball to drop just wide.

Perry uncharacteristically missed a convert the rebound from a Trigwell save and Pamment saw another goal bound effort blocked by some heroic defending.

Hill finally added the second they had been threatening for so long just before the hour mark. Tyrese Mthunzi laid off to Ward cutting inside and firing a low effort into the bottom corner.

A flurry of substitutions followed in the final 30 minutes, Hassocks sending on the likes of Liam Benson, Jack Troak and Bradley Tighe.

For Hill, the familiar name of A Trialist entered proceedings. This particular A Trialist made a real impression, going close on two occasions before teeing up Finney for the goal

of the game.

Finney had a lot to do when he received the ball with his back to goal and three red shirts blocking his path.

A beautiful first touch on the turn took him away from Sam Geard and Tighe, opening up enough of a gap for Finney to leather the ball beyond the helpless Trigwell.

Hassocks did at least finish on the front foot, creating three scoring opportunities. Ben Bacon led a charge forward, dribbling around three Hill defenders.

Some nice link up with Geard eventually worked the ball to Kyle Woolven, whose early shot from outside the box crashed into the side netting.

A teasing Troak inswinging corner was then headed just wide by Benson before Troak himself fired over from a tight angle after a clever Mike Williamson pass opened up the Hillians defence.

Hassocks 0-2 Whitehawk

With the big kick off for the 2023 -24 Southern Combination League campaign just a week away, Hassocks gave a much improved performance in their toughest friendly of pre-season.

Isthmian Premier Division outfit Whitehawk had won 7-1 at the Beacon a year ago.

It was a much tighter game on this occasion, the Robins competing well with opponents from two division above before succumbing to a 2-0 defeat.

Whitehawk made eight half time changes. The biggest impact though came from Dom Johnson-Fisher switching from left wing to right, resulting in the former Steyning Town Hassocks number one made a fine man becoming an ever increasing influence.

Bradley Tighe cleared a Johnson-Fisher cross over the Hassocks bar which for a brief moment looked like it might result in a wonderful own goal.

Another Johnson-Fisher cross turned into a shot in midair, forcing Fraser Trigwell into an excellent save at full stretch pawing the ball around the far post.

It was from the opposite flank to Johnson-Fisher that Whitehawk opened the scoring just before the hour mark.

Luke Robinson cut in from the right and bent an effort from the corner of the area into the opposite side of the net for a spectacular goal.

One became two less than 60 possession almost straight from kick off, Tom Cadman crossed and Johnson-Fisher popped up in the middle of the box to convert beyond Triawell.

Bull had to cover round and clear after Andy Somo poked a long ball over the top through the legs of Trigwell.

Another chance came the way of Somo when he twisted and turned to find space in the box from a Johnson-Fisher cross.

Somo had only Trigwell to beat as a result of his trickery, but the save to turn the ball over the bar.

Robins earn deserved point to kick off the new campaign

The opening game of the 2023-24 Southern Combination League season took some time to get going, but once it did a big crowd at the Beacon were treated to some high-quality entertainment by Hassocks and Eastbourne Town.

It finished 1-1, a result which Robins head coach James Westlake said he felt fair afterwards. Most of those watching agreed with that assessment.

Both sides though could feasibly have walked away with all three points; Hassocks had they been a little more clinical and Town were it not for an extraordinary save from Fraser Trigwell right at the death.

Evan Archibald thought he had won it with his traditional goal against Hassocks, only for Trigwell to somehow keep out the forward's header one-handed at full stretch.

The Robins had created the better second half opportunities before that, including when hitting a post as they mounted wave upon wave of attacks towards the west end of the ground.

In contrast, the first half was pretty turgid. It felt at times more like a pre-season friendly rather than the start of the competitive action.

There were appeals from the Town bench for a third minute penalty when George Cook went to ground under a Joe Bull challenge.

Cook's lack of protest was evidence that referee Perry Hart had made the correct call in awarding a corner rather than a spot kick.

Mr Hart had a fine game overall. The only major decision he got wrong was to award Hassocks a free kick on the edge of the box following a well-timed Delwin Duah sliding tackle, from which Jack Troak drove a powerful effort through the wall which repelled by a strong Taylor Seymour wrist.

Seymour was in the midst of a busy weekend having been man-of-

the-match for Burgess Hill in their 1-0 friendly win at Whitehawk the previous evening.

Further chances before the break were limited. Town left winger Max Hollobone blasted into the children's playground from a good position 18 yards out and Troak flashed a ball across the face of goal which neither Westlake nor Tom Frankland could quite latch onto.

Hassocks debutant centre back Matt Gunn made a good block on the stroke of half time after a lovely 40 yard switch from Hollobone created a shooting opportunity for Ollie Davies cutting in from the right.

The Robins hitting the upright gave an early indication that the second 45 was going to be far more watchable than the first.

Jamie Wilkes crossed, Benson's glancing header came back off the post and Troak could not quite sort his body out in time as the rebound hit him from point blank range and diverted wide.

A few minutes later and Town took the lead. An attempted back pass to Trigwell from 30 yards away ended going out for a corner nowhere near the goalkeeper.

Laughter at that comedic moment soon turned to despair. Hollobone whipped in a dangerous delivery turned in by the stretching Nathan Hover at the back post.

Charlie Gibson. Town retain Trigwell's intervention working the ball It was from

Town left back Harry Simmons almost diverted a Bull cross beyond Seymour, the relief on Simmons' face being palpable when the ball flew inches wide.

That relief would prove to be short lived, however, as Simmons would go onto provide Hassocks with their equaliser on 67 minutes.

Frankland nearly levelled before Simmons' own goal arrived. Gunn picked out Troak, who produced an outrageous piece of skill to lift the ball over the head of Leon Greig and escape down the left flank.





From there, Troak hung up a cross to the back post. Frankland saw his initial header blocked by Simmons and then put the rebound into the side netting from a tight angle.

The lively Frankland made way after that for new loan signing from Three Bridges, Elliott Hanslow.

It did not take long for Hanslow to make an impression, his pressure on Simmons leading the Town defender to turn a Bull cross into the back of his own net.

The final 20 minutes brought a flurry of action at both ends. For Hassocks, Westlake saw an effort saved by Seymour and then fired high, wide and handsome from a Pat Harding layoff.

Harding himself saw a snap volley on the turn blocked. Harding's fellow substitute Ben Bacon crossed for Hanslow to head too high and Bacon then sent an effort into neighbouring Hurstpierpoint when he had more time to advance than he realised.

For Town, Archibald saw a goal correctly ruled out for offside and Trigwell saved bravely at the feet of Charlie Gibson.

Town retained possession from Trigwell's intervention, patiently working the ball back towards Greig.

Around the League...



Another new season is upon us with several changes... not least the name, which is now officially the Premier Sports Southern Combination League. Here is everything else you need to know ahead of the 2023-24 campaign...

We will face three new teams in the Premier Division this season: one relegated from the Isthmian League, one promoted from **Division One and another moved** sideways from the Wessex League.

It is the relegated club who will undoubtedly be of most interest to Robins fans, with the return of Havwards Heath Town to the Southern Combination after five seasons bringing about a return of the Mid Sussex Derby.

Heath will be amongst the favourites to make an immediate return to step four under Jay Lovett, who has put together a squad littered with ex-Hassocks players.

Charlie Pitcher has moved to Hanbury Park from Littlehampton Town, George Brown remains with Heath after signing from Burgess Hill Town at the backend of the previous campaign and young JJ Minty has joined Heath after playing for us on a dual-signing agreement from the Hillians last season.

We will face Heath in the traditional holiday matches, hosting at the Beacon on Boxing Day before making the short trip north on Easter Monday.

Our old friends at Shoreham have been promoted after winning the Division One title last season, ending a four year absence from the Premier Division in the process.

Under the management of former Robins striker Michael Death, the Musselmen were the outstanding team at step six last season and will be hoping to make an impression on their return to the top division.

Hassocks supporters will get an early opportunity to see what Shoreham are all about when they visit the Beacon on August Bank Holiday Monday, kick off 11am at the Beacon.

The third newcomers (or in this case, oldcomers moved back to the Southern Combination League after a year away) are Pagham.

Having struggled in the much tougher Wessex League last season after being shoved over there by the FA, the Lions will fancy their chances of pushing for one of the top six places they used to have a monopoly on in the Southern Combination.

Broadbridge Heath, Alfold and Roffey have all left the Premier Division. The Bears earned a welldeserved promotion after claiming their first ever Southern Combination League title whilst Alfold and Roffey were relegated into Division One.

Whereas last summer saw almost half the Premier Division change managers, the merry-go-round has been a little slower in 2023.

Of most interest to Hassocks supporters will be the appointment of Combined Counties having won the Peter Barkley at our Tuesday night opponents Loxwood and Kieran Ridley taking over at Saltdean United.

Starting with Loxwood, Barkley and his assistant Michael Lockhart bring with them the Bunch of Amateurs YouTube channel, meaning viewers will be able to take a look behind-the-scenes at the Nest throughout the season.

Saltdean meanwhile climbed clear of the drop zone in the final few weeks of the season having replaced our former head coach Brad Sweetman with their women's manager Joe McTiffen.

Ridley has since made the move from Newhaven Under 23s and has so far retained a number of the young players who followed Sweetman from the Beacon to Hill Park last summer.

Division One has two new sides for 2023-24 along with Roffey and Alfold.

Copthorne have been promoted

into senior football for the first time after finishing as runners up to Jarvis Brook in Division Two last season.

Former Brighton midfielder Simon Funnell is in charge with home games being played at Horsham's Camping World Stadium, enabling Copthorne to pass the relevant ground grading criteria.

Unfortunately, Jarvis Brook were unable to take their place in Division One after the Lime Kiln failed its inspection in controversial circumstances.

The other new club are Banstead Athletic. The As finished 19th of 20 in the Combined Counties Premier South last season but rather than be relegated into Division One of the Surrey-based league, they take the place of Epsom & Ewell in the Southern Combination.

Epsom consequently go into the Southern Combination Division One promotion playoffs back in April, rather than following Shoreham into the Premier.

Hailsham Town were the one side relegated from Division One, taking the place of Copthorne. With no teams being promoted into Division Two and Charlwood folding, the league will contain only 13 clubs for the 2023-24 campaign.

Finally, a note on balls. You may notice that with Macron Store Hastings having been replaced by Premier Sports, the matchday footballs being used across the Southern Combination League this season will be made by Mitre rather than Macron.

Loxwood v Hassocks

We head to the Nest on Tuesday night as the first opponents to visit Loxwood for a competitive game against new manager Peter Barkley and his rebuilt squad, who will be hoping to impress on their home bow

Loxwood last season

Having finished in the bottom two in 2021-22 and spared relegation into Division One only due to ground grading, the Magpies avoided any drama in 2022-23 thanks to a strong finish to the campaign lifting them 12 points clear of the drop zone and into 15th spot. To build on that lower midtable finish, Loxwood have appointed former Kingstonian and Corinthian Casuals coach Peter Barkley as their new manager. Barkley said upon his appointment at the Nest that the aim is to be competitive in the top half of the table this season. The Magpies have been busy on the transfer front, securing a number of new additions with step five and above experience

which will make them something of an unknown quantity in the early weeks of the campaign.

Head-to-head

The sides first clashed in the 2014-15 season when Loxwood secured promotion to the Premier Division for the first time. Since then, there have been 16 meetings, all of which have come in the bread and butter of league football. We have won four, drawn four and lost eight. After a relatively sluggish start in terms of entertainment, the fixture has now provided 27 goals in the past seven matches.

Last time we met

We recorded consecutive clean sheet

number four in what would prove to be a club-record sequence of five shutouts in a row when Loxwood came to the Beacon in March. At the other end, goals from Alex Bygraves and Phil Johnson in eight minutes either side of the hour mark secured a 2-0 victory.

How to get to the Nest

Follow the A272 to and through Billingshurst, crossing the roundabout with the A29 before joining the B2133 shortly after. Pass through Newpound and Roundstreet Common, approaching a fork in the road with Skiff Lane. Plaistow Road is just on the left after that with the ground on your left a very short distance down it.

The Magic of the FA Cup is back at the Beacon as we host Southern Counties East League Premier Division side Erith Town in what looks to an extremely tough draw given the Dockers' impressive 2022-23 campaign

Erith Town last season

Like Hassocks, Erith Town enjoyed their best campaign since 2013-14 last time out. A fourth placed finish in the Southern Counties East League Premier Division was their second highest ever placing after the third place achieved nine years previously. It also maintained their fine record of finishing in the top six in each of the last three completed campaigns. That impressive league form transferred to both the national cup competitions. In the FA Cup, the Dockers went all the way to the first qualifying round where they were eliminated by Three Bridges. Bridges famously went onto draw Hereford United at home later in the competition. Erith meanwhile advanced to the fourth round of the

FA Vase, knocking out Southern Combination runners up Crawley Down Gatwick along the way.

Head-to-head

We have faced the Dockers on four previous occasions, all in the FA Cup. A 2-2 preliminary qualifying round draw at the Erith Sports Stadium in August 2000 was followed by a 3-1 Hassocks victory three days later back here at the Beacon. We were paired together again in the 2005-06 campaign in the extra preliminary round. Pat Harding scored twice and Anthony Hibbert once at the start of a memorable FA Cup run which only came to an end two games away from the first round proper. The fourth and most recent clash came

five years ago in the 2018-19 season...

Last time we met

The Robins were in the midst of a terrible run against opponents from outside the Southern Combination League in national cup competitions. When Spencer Slaughter put us 1-0 ahead with seven minutes played, there was some hope that a rare victory over a non-Sussex club might be on the cards. Unfortunately, said hope lasted all of three minutes before Alex Nelson equalised for Erith. Luis Valencia made it 2-1 midway through the first half before adding his second and the Dockers' third with the game in its final few seconds.

Our third home fixture in the opening three weeks of the season brings Lingfield to the Beacon, opponents who continue to thrive in the Premier Division despite often living a somewhat nomadic existence

Lingfield last season

Problems with their Godstone Road home throughout the campaign meant Lingfield switching venues frequently; either moving games to 3G pitches or asking the visiting side to host instead. It says much about the quality they have that the Lingers still managed to finish in 14th position in the Premier Division table. They won 10, drew four and lost 24 of their matches. Throughout the first half of the campaign, they earned a reputation as one of the most entertaining sides to watch with a goals for record which put them in the top five for the division and a goals against record which was amongst the five worst.

Head-to-head

There have been 33 meetings with the Robins leading the head-to-head with 15 wins to the Lingers' 10, leaving eight draws. Lingfield had been the dominant side in recent years but since January 2022 we have gone unbeaten in four matches, winning three and drawing one.

Last time we met

Lingfield surrendered home advantage, requesting that the Beacon host our clash on the penultimate weekend of last season rather than Godstone Road. A somewhat ill-tempered affair went the way of "the visitors" as two goals from Liam Benson and one from Pat Harding secured a 3-1 win. Conor

Wilford scored the consolation for Lingfield whilst a very bemused Mike Williamson found himself going for a 10 minute spell in the sin bin despite being one of the most polite and friendly gentlemen on the Southern Combination League circuit.

Played for both

Not many individuals have turned out for both ourselves and the Lingers. Ben Bacon is one and he has a formidable record scoring against his former club, so fingers crossed that rears its head again. The other is Daley Clark, who moved to the Robins from Godstone Road in the summer of 2009. He went onto play 40 times in Hassocks colours.
